Henry Cobb, a warm and honest man, has proudly poured 57 years of sweat and blood into his family's brickyard. After toiling from dusk until dawn every day but Sunday, every week of the year, Henry's passion for his work disappears and is replaced by grief from the death of his wife and fear of automation's increasing hold on American manufacturing. Then, 12-year-old Danny Potter enters Henry's life. Henry becomes a mentor to the boy, offering Danny a refuge from his bickering parents and the role model he so desperately needs. In turn, Danny rejuvenates Henry's passion for life.

Questions for Discussion

SUCCESS

The Last Brickmaker in America explores the difference between the world's version of success and the actions that bring true and lasting joy. Danny's father seeks success in higher pay and more prestige at work, but he loses his family as a result. His foreman sees success as getting things done quickly and cheaply, but Henry sees success in doing a job right, even when it takes more time and effort.



QUESTIONS

God's guidelines for success in life are often very different from the "rules" of the world. How did The Last Brickmaker in America demonstrate this principle?

How do you and your family define success? What can you and your family learn from Henry when it comes to doing the job right no matter the cost?

Is your pursuit of wealth a higher priority than your family right now? If so, what specific things can you begin to prioritize today to make more of an investment in your family?

Lazy hands make for poverty, but diligent hands bring wealth. PROVERBS 10:4 NIV






PASSION

SCRIPTURE PASSAGES FOR REFLECTION

Danny's parents had given up on each other and their marriage, but as they watched their son change, their hearts were softened toward one another as well.

QUESTIONS

Think of a time when you gave up hope. Perhaps a relationship was falling apart, a circumstance just seemed too daunting, or you made a poor decision that cost you dearly. How did you come out on the other side? Did you see God's hand in redeeming the situation?

Are you still in the midst of a seemingly hopeless circumstance? How might God give you a second chance if you open your heart to Him?
